

#### Psalm 23

Read in a manner chosen by the Presider: direct recitation (unison), antiphonally (side to side)) or responsive recitation (leader and people) alternating either by verse or at the asterisk.

- 2 You make me lie down in green pastures \* and lead me beside still waters.
- 3 You revive my soul \* and guide me along right pathways for the sake of your Name.
- 4 Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I shall fear no evil; \*
  for you are with me;
  your rod and your staff, they comfort me.
- 5 You spread a table before me in the presence of those who trouble me; \* you have anointed my head with oil, and my cup is running over.
- 6 Surely your goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, \* and I will dwell in the house of God for ever.
- Glory to God, Source of all being, Incarnate Word, and Holy Spirit, \* as it was in the beginning, is now and will be forever. Amen.

#### The Lessons

# First Reading: Acts 4:5-12

**Lector:** A reading from the book of Acts.

The rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, "By what power or by what name did you do this?" Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, "Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been

healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is `the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.' There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved."

**Lector** Hear what the Spirit is saying to the Churches.

**People** Thanks be to God.

A period of silence is kept.

Canticle: A Song of the Heavenly City Revelation 21:22-26, 22:1-4 EOW 38

Said responsively by whole verse alternating between Officiant and People.

I saw no temple in the city, \*

for its temple is the God of surpassing strength and the Lamb.

And the city has no need of sun or moon to light it, \*

for the glory of God shines on it, and its lamp is the Lamb.

By its light the nations shall walk, \*

and the rulers of the world lay their honor and glory there.

Its gates shall never be shut by day, nor shall there be any night; \* into it they will bring the honor and glory of nations.

I saw the clean river of the water of life, bright as crystal, \*

flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb.

# Second Reading: 1 John 3:16-24

Lector: A reading from the first letter of John.

We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us-- and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him. And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another,

just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

**People** Thanks be to God.

Gospel: John 10:11-18

Please remain seated for the reading of the Gospel in the service of Morning Prayer.

**Officiant:** A reading from the Gospel according to John.

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."





## Fourth Sunday of Easter—Year B

Welcome to Saint James Church. This Sunday of Easter is traditionally called "Good Shepherd Sunday." Each year we hear a part of Jesus' discourse on his relationship to us in the image of the Good Shepherd. The Good Shepherd loves his sheep so much that he lays down his life for them. We are called by him into his life, the life which he has given for us. Today's reading from the Acts of the Apostles continues the story of the first days of the Church. Peter and the other Apostles are on trial before the rulers of the people because in spite of being commanded to speak no more of Jesus, they had continued to preach and to heal in his name. Today we hear portion of Peter's response. The reading today from 1 John tells us that as God's children we are to reveal God's love by living in love with all other people. That love is to be more than a kind feeling. We cannot claim to have God's love if we do not care for the needs of our poor and neglected brothers and sisters. Our identity now comes from God and our lives are to reflect God's own nature and love. How we live reveals our relationship to God. Thus the description of the Church as the Body of Christ is not merely an analogy. It describes our life together as the embodiment of Christ's love and mercy toward all people. We are not only "the sheep of his pasture," but we are to shepherd all his people in his name.
